Landscape Design Concept

The design ideas for the landscape at Udlington House are a fusion of the old Victorian elements still evident in the grounds and of new features designed to facilitate enjoyment of the landscape by residents of the new home. Attention has been made to the restoration of existing features based on the 1981 plan of the grounds, and to providing a varied, stimulating and picturesque environment to both look at and to interact with.



K Car Parking Area

with reconstructed building to accommodate motor and disabled parking. Steps like planting and surface treatment to reduce the scale of the car parking area.

J Intimate Cottage Garden

Small English cottage enclosure garden with colorful borders, feature planting and seating area. Leading on to the Parterre Garden. Raised planting beds for residents use.

H Feature Planting Island

With wild floral lawn and planting to enhance the specimen beach tree. Planting to screen parking spaces.

I Formal Lawn Area

Formal lawn at the main entrance to Udlington House with a decorative shrub border at the western boundary. Feature planting and seating area in Secret Woodland Garden area along the perimeter.



G Woodland Garden

Quiet corner with arbour seating for resting. Additional planting to accommodate existing trees of interest and to create calm and serenity.

F Avenue of Trees

Prunus avium 'Plena' trees along the main driveway to Udlington House.

A Parterre Gardens

Formal garden with parterres of differing character. Wide walkways, raised borders and numerous residences for residents including a summer house or covered structure.

Disabled Access

It would not be necessary to use stepped pathways in the parterre garden. Access paths and paths turning east-west are able to be ramped in accordance with DDA requirements. In addition, extra wide pathways and some raised parterre beds ensure access and recreation for less able residents should this be desired.

B Fruit Orchard & Meadows

Reinstated orchard as seen on the 1981 Ordnance Survey extract (see Landscape Design Statement). Informal mown grass paths and wildflower meadows to be encouraged for residents enjoyment.

C Landscape Parkland and Pond Area

New pond with areas of informal planting and meadows, the focal point of perimeter walkway routes around the parkland.



D Pinetum Woodland Copse

Existing woodland to be thinned in accordance with arboricultural report to improve amenity value and health of trees. Underpinning with shrub species to form a woodland backdrop and to screen glimpsed views of the development from Udlington Manor.

E Ornamental Pond Area

Reinstated pond with new bridge. Restored Yew features, required vegetation and additional aquatic and understorey planting. Walkways and associated seating points. Area subject to artist design and reinstatement works.



Design Elements

- Sundial
- Trellis Walkway
- Vegetable Parterres on raised beds
- Summer House
- Existing Greenhouse and Working Area with Shed
- Bee Hive
- Courtyard
- Dell Garden
- Tree Seat
- Conifer Trees to enhance the landscape parkland setting
- Ha Ha (Lay section of hedge to allow view over Ha Ha)
- Existing stumpy repositioned to overlook the grounds to the east over the reinstated Ha Ha.
- Croquet Lawn
- Face-up and top Yew Hedge reinstating the formal vegetation features.
- Yew hedging adjoining the existing re-shaped hedging
- Seating positioned to face Udlington House
- Woodland Copse Planting: Contributing to both the overall landscape design and to mitigation of the visual impacts of the development to the north of the site (refer to Visual Impact Assessment for detail). This planting contributes to the landscape parkland setting, used for informal recreation and walking, it was a favorite Victorian past time.
